

Last month, Dr. Moureau taught an Ultrasound Guided Peripheral IV (UGPIV) Mastery Class at the Puget Sound chapter of the Association for Vascular Access. Attendees received 4 CEs for the workshop component and 12 for the online learning prerequisite courses. They were also able to complete the required demonstration component and take the final exam to earn their UGPIV Mastery Certificate.

She also gave a presentation about techniques to prevent hospital onset bacteremia from vascular access devices.

She will be speaking on this important topic again in San Francisco at the <u>UCSF Vascular Access Conference</u> July 18-19, and the topic All About Midlines: Applications, Education, and Outcomes in Raleigh, NC on July 24th at the UNC Symposium.

QUESTION

Why is it important to establish a standardized system for training in vascular access?

ANSWER

Consistent, high-quality outcomes with ultrasound-guided peripheral IV (UGPIV) insertions require more than just access to equipment—they demand competency-based education and training in aspects like:

- Learning to identify key ultrasound needle signs to improve visualization and precision
- Establishing minimum performance standards through simulated insertions before progressing to patient care
- Identifying mastery learning principles for quantitative documentation of progress
- Learning how to explain and teach processes to others.

When clinicians train with mastery in mind, they gain more than skills—they gain confidence, consistency, and clinical success.

According to INS 2024 Standards and Mastery Learning Principles: Employ a systems-based approach to infusion and vascular access competencies centered on standardized policies and procedures applied across the entire organization. Measure competency by performance and not by a time or a predetermined number of procedures. There is no established number of procedures performed that will ensure competency for any skill.

Consider establishing a mastery learning process for simulation and insertion training that allows the learner to repeat training steps if the mastery rating score is less than a level established by institutional policy. Mastery Learning advances clinicians to supervised patient insertions based on scored performance.


